## Making a Difference in our Communities

The success of the Community Foundation of Newfoundland and Labrador (CFNL) continues, thanks to the hard work of its board and new executive director, Carmella Butland.

In 2005 the foundation welcomed three new board members, Doug Chafe, Sheila Devine and Viki O'Dea. It also attracted new corporate and individual donors and set up new funds to benefit Newfoundlanders and Labradorians.

Returns from our endowment account, managed by a professional investment manager, are being awarded as grants to support local charities, ranging from a school on the west coast to a university on the east coast, a traditional cooking course in Labrador and to a healthy baby club on the south coast.

### **CFNL Endowment**

The Community Foundation of Newfoundland and Labrador is a province-wide registered charity that manages endowment funds for individuals, families, businesses and organizations. The foundation distributes the income from these funds as grants to many

humanitarian, educational, cultural, and health non-profits in Newfoundland and Labrador.

A copy of our audited financial statement from David A. Hood, Chartered Accountant, is available upon request The CFNL funds are managed by Will Small of Scotia-MacLeod. Mr. Small took charge of the CFNL investments early in 2005 and works closely with the board to implement successful investment strategies.

The Community Foundation of Newfoundland and Labrador (CFNL) awarded three charities \$1,000 each to support innovative programs that benefit Newfoundlanders and Labradorians.

The Alzheimer Society of Newfoundland and Labrador will use the funding to provide materials for resource centres around the province to help families living with the disease; the Burin Peninsula Brighter Futures Inc. to support programs such as their Healthy Baby Clubs and resource centres that focus on the needs of children of low-

income families; and the Buckmaster's Circle Community Centre to assist with a Parenting Power program that is dedicated to fostering confident and happy parents by developing skills that make parenting easier.

The money was awarded at the foundation's second annual grants ceremony at the Buckmaster's Circle Community Centre on December 9<sup>th</sup>, 2005.

"It's a difficult task to decide who will receive grants from our Community Fund" says Sharon Duggan, chair of the foundation's grants committee. "We received over 50 applications and after careful consideration chose these three organizations. We are very pleased to be able to distribute these grants and with our growing reputation as a charity that focuses on the needs of Newfoundlanders and Labradorians."

Grants are funded with the returns from donations and endowments received from businesses and individuals wishing to give back to the communities that are an integral part of their success.

Thanks to the Community Foundation of Newfoundland and Labrador, school-children all over the province are being given the opportunity and funding to develop creative projects about their physical health.

Fit for School is a school competition that provides

up to \$1000 annually from the Dr. Harry Roberts Fund to generate innovative projects in the areas of fitness, wellness, health and/or physical education.
